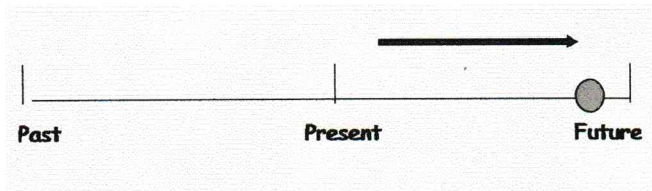


## Future Perfect



The Future Perfect refers to an action that will be completed a time in the future. (It is not a very common verb form).

Example: I will have done all my work by this evening.

### Affirmative

Subject	will have	past participle	completer
I	will have	perfected	my English
He	will have	taken	ten tests.

### Negative

Subject	will + not + have	past participle	completer
I	will not have (won't have)	perfected	my English
He	will not have (won't have)	taken	ten tests.

### Interrogative

will	subject + have	past participle	completer
will	you have	perfected	my English
will	he have	taken	ten tests?
